Schoolreaders improving literacy increasing life chances

A message from our Founder and CEO, Jane Whitbread



It's a pleasure to be writing this in Spring 2021 with children now back in school. I'd like to begin by thanking you all for your patience and contributions over this past difficult, pandemic year. In particular, thank you to our wonderful volunteers who had to pause their in-school volunteering and who are eager to return to their schools when it is safe and practicable.

Thankfully, we were able to adapt our in-school volunteering reading support provision quickly during school closures and continued reaching thousands of children with reading support through both digital volunteering and our hugely popular Schoolreaders Storytime

programme. Our 1,500 partner primary schools received 3 recorded video stories every week which they used both in-school and sent to parents for their children at home. We have been inundated with messages of thanks for these.

The fall-out of lost education due to school closures over the past year is now being assessed and the findings make stark reading. The children most affected by lost reading skills are the 5/6 year olds, but the same study found that they can catch up quickly with the right support. Even more concerning is the recent Government suggestion that one in three children will be transitioning from primary to secondary school this year not being able to read properly. The children that have been most affected are those who were already disadvantaged.

The need for Schoolreaders support has never been greater. Our aim over the past seven years has been to give all primary school children the opportunity to read well so that they can then fully access their secondary education and make the most of life's opportunities. Even pre-pandemic one in four children was leaving primary school not reading properly. Our volunteers are in great demand - over 10% of the primary schools in England have registered with us asking for our volunteers and more join every week.

Further news is that we have developed an online volunteer training portal and have had a huge surge in new volunteer applications. We now have a 'small army' of volunteers able to help children's reading in a local school. We hope to be supporting 20,000 children with weekly one-to-one support by the end of the year. Our proven model is simple and scaleable.

In order to meet this enormous need we also need to raise the funding to recruit, select, interview and match new volunteers to a school. With the increase in need and numbers this is a challenge. We have recently launched our Race for Reading campaign to help with this and we are also hoping for support through gifts in wills. We are extremely grateful to those of you reading this who are financial supporters.

We are very well positioned to help thousands of children to catch up on lost reading skills so that the negative effects of the pandemic on education won't have a lifelong impact. Your support is crucial to this.

INTERVIEW with Ellen Krajewski


Chair of Judges for the 2021 Carnegie Medal


We find out what it's like to lead the expert panel that awards the most prestigious children's literary prize of the year.

The CILIP Carnegie Medal and its sister award, the Kate Greenaway Medal, are the UK's oldest and best-loved children's book awards. While the Greenaway Medal recognises excellence in illustration, the Carnegie Medal rewards the finest writing and each year honours the children's book that gives 'the most outstanding reading experience'. Receiving the award is often the crowning achievement of a writer's career and, as one would expect, deciding on a winner is a painstaking and sometimes difficult process. Ellen Krajewski, a former school librarian, is Chairing this year's judging panel for organising body CILIP, the Chartered Institute of Library and Information Professionals.

The awards are unique in being judged solely by librarians, reflecting the origins of the prize as a memorial to Andrew Carnegie (1835-1919) the Scottish-American industrialist and philanthropist, whose grants funded more than 3,500 public libraries in the USA and UK. Ellen's judging panel is made up of librarians from the 12 UK library regions, plus 2 others coopted to the panel to ensure its diversity. The group reads and assesses against detailed criteria, all books nominated for the 2 medals - 152 this year. During lockdown, panel meetings have taken place on Zoom rather than at CILIP HQ in Bloomsbury, as the longlist is whittled down to a shortlist, with a single winner due to be announced in June. Without giving away any secrets, Ellen says that despite the challenges of this year's remote judging, achieving a consensus has been a smooth process, although she says that this is not always the case!














Remember these?

The list of Carnegie winners is a roll-call of the finest children's authors of the last 85 years - starting with Arthur Ransome who won the first Medal in1936 with 'Pigeon Post'.

Children and young people have their say via a shadowing process which sees groups in schools and local libraries all over the country reading the shortlist and voting for their own winner. Asked about her own childhood reading, Ellen confirms the central role that school libraries and their heroic librarians play in guiding children towards books. When she was 6, an end-of-afternoon reading of Laura Ingalls Wilder's 'Little House on the Prairie' ignited a lifelong love of books which has today placed her at the head of a judging panel with one of the most eagerly-anticipated decisions of the literary year in its hands.


Fundraising heroes


